Importance and relevance of thinking about societal issues.

- Thinking = umbrella term for many cognitive activities.
- Why is it so important? --> For making conscious choices.

- <u>> Challenge</u>: You want to find ways to minimize the obstacles for refugees to participate in social activities in your community.

Action oriented thinking – a step-by-step plan

Goal-orientedness

- Think about societal issues.
- Define what about the issue touches you
- Define a challenge accordingly
- Set up a strategy to achieve the goal (action)
- Reflect on the process





Key Thinking Processes

Key Thinking Processes

- compare different volumes water shower, bath, kitchen, ...
- compare different volumes necessary for members of your family, roommates, ...
- ask questions such as ..
- **brainstorm** about different ways to organize free social activities
- describe/make a list of free or easy accessible activities in the community
- examine or explore the causes of the more isolated life of young refugees
- **classify** activities in the classroom or elsewhere in terms of access, language demands, budget, ...

brainstorm







Tips & Tricks

- 1. Consider carefully which **thinking processes** you want your pupils to apply.
- 2. Formulate questions in an **invitational** way (plural) What is >> What might be some ..?
- 3. Formulate questions in a **tentative** way What might be the message?

- Elicit metacognition

Visualize thinking about societal issues.

Reflection – how was your experience?

Question – what could be the benefit?

- -More engagement
- -More space for formative evaluation
- -Enhances the metacognitive competence
- -Opens the dialogue and keeps it running
- -Develops thinking disposition (demonstrates value of thinking.)
- -Feeds and inspires ideas and thoughts






How to visualize thinking about societal issues?

Visual thinking tool

- Dynamic
- Reflect the thinking
- Makes thinking common
- Helps you to formulate your thoughts
- Is the way to a deeper understanding
- Elaboration on ideas of others







How to visualize thinking about societal issues?

- 1. Language (spoken & written)
 - Ask questions purposefully
 - Reflect upon the thinking that is applied
 - Valorize by giving specific feedback
 - Paraphrase (which requires active listening by teacher)
- 2. Visualizing for the eye
 - By documenting
 - By visualizing thinking tools (Hyerle ..)
