Knowledge and critical understanding





We do not learn from experience. We learn from reflecting on experience (John Dewey)

- Reflection as important element of the learning process.
- Reflection
 - is a mental activity during which an individual consciously observes and thinks about own and shared/common experiences and/or behaviour.
 - is a meaning-making process
 - o can be done both individually and in group.





Benefits of collaborative reflection

- Affirmation of the value of one's experience.
 In isolation what matters can be too easily dismissed as unimportant.
- Seeing things in a new perspective
 Others offer alternative meanings, broadening the field of understanding regarding (past) experiences.
- When one is **accountable to a group,** one feels a responsibility toward others that is more compelling than the responsibility we feel towards only ourselves.














Evaluation

- determining the merit, worth or value of a result or process (Scriven 1991)
 For this, it is important to collect and analyse relevant information about what is being evaluated
- is useful to formulate a judgement based on internal and/or external criteria.







Evaluation: teachers / students

Evaluation is an important **task of teachers** and is useful in several ways:

- to support the development of teaching activities or a learning process (formative evaluation).
- to assess the final impact of the learning or teaching activity (summative evaluation)

Evaluative thinking is also important for students:

• They should learn to use their analytical and critical thinking skills to evaluate situations, options, behaviours, beliefs, things, etc., but also their own behaviours, beliefs, or product of their activities.
